#### REPORT FROM YOUR BOARD

As our community celebrates its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary, do you ever wonder why Canterbury Common homes are in high demand? Or why homes sell within days at prices over asking? The condition of each house and property is a significant reason but the surrounding lands and The Centre are part of the equity of each home. Realtors emphasize these features to their clients and some even ask permission to show off The Centre and the pool. The beautiful lands and the gardens around The Centre make a wonderful impression on future owners. The Centre is a showcase and buyers are surprised to learn that the space can be rented by residents for private functions at very low cost. The entrance at Coulter and Waterbury welcomes visitors to our community of manicured lawns and landscaped gardens. For over twenty-five years Canterbury Common has been a preferred location for people seeking to live in an adult lifestyle community.

The miracle of Canterbury is that all of the shared property, facilities and services are maintained by volunteers. Residents contribute their time, energy and expertise in sharing the many responsibilities to maintain the high standards that we all enjoy here. Volunteers look after the building and the pool. Volunteers tend to the gardens around The Centre and the entrance on Coulter. Volunteers look after the governance, management and financial responsibilities of our not-for-profit corporation. Volunteers handle almost all of the upkeep and repairs for the building, the lands and the facilities. Volunteers organize and run all of the social events and activities that we enjoy. Volunteers create and distribute communications via email and our website. Volunteers liaise with our civic officials, charitable organizations and health services. More than one hundred residents are engaged in the work of the seven standing committees and the Board of Directors. The annual cost of outsourcing these tasks to a management company is estimated to be half a million dollars which would cost each home almost \$1,500 per year. The assessment fee for this year is \$600 per home. The difference is due to the cumulative efforts of our volunteers.

The demographics of Canterbury Common are rapidly changing. Many of the original owners have moved away and most of the new homeowners are twenty to thirty years younger than the founders' group. The new cohort is of the same age as their predecessors who laid down the foundation for this community and the Canterbury Common Residents' Association. Some of the past volunteers have been active for twenty plus years. Some of the new residents have joined the volunteer groups. The blend of past and new residents has made a healthy impact on our operations and services but there are vacancies that must be filled on every committee – especially on Administration and House & Property. Volunteer positions are listed on the CCRA website and require a small amount of time. Collectively these vacancies must be filled or the responsibilities will be outsourced at an additional cost to all homeowners. The other option is to discontinue some of the things we offer like the gardens and the pool, communications and social events.

The work of volunteers is more than a means to save money. Volunteerism provides a chance to meet new friends and engage in meaningful roles that benefit the entire community. The spirit of Canterbury Common is embedded in the work of our volunteers. We should be thankful for their service and step up to do our share if we want to preserve this community for the next twenty-five years.

Key Highlights for Canterbury Common Residents Association, Fiscal Q1:

- 1. The Annual Dues (assessment) collection is largely done. Thanks to all of you for making this a smooth process, despite a glitch from my end that affected a few residents.
- 2. A Replacement Reserve Fund review was recently completed. For details see the separate article in this issue.
- 3. We recently received a new property tax assessment for three parcels of land transferred to us in 2021 (former golf club lands). We are working with the Township of Scugog and MPAC (Municipal Property Assessment Corp) to have these reassessed. MPAC determines the value of the property and Scugog uses This valuation to set the taxes. Our expectation is they will treat these new lands similarly to the way The Centre and surrounding property is assessed, where the property taxes are nil. While I am optimistic, this is not a sure thing.
- 4. We have a couple of other projects recently started by the Finance Committee:
  - a. a review of Banking Services to ensure we have access to the services we need and at market rates
  - b. an energy audit to ensure we are operating efficiently and identifying any savings opportunities

#### **GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE**

Allow me to start by wishing Gord Simmons a well-deserved retirement and thank him for his years of involvement in developing and administering the legacy programs we use each day when talking to homeowners about the outdoor projects. Gord continues to be actively involved in the Canterbury Land Development Corporation (CLDC) Transition Committee working tirelessly towards finalizing the ongoing Geranium Homes projects. On a personal note, I thank Gord for the training he provided me as a new resident and the meticulous records he passed on to me in June in order to make this a relatively smooth transition.

During recent Meet and Greet Sessions for new residents at The Centre we shared the importance of understanding the By-Laws, Protective Restriction Guidelines and the CLDC Covenant Restrictions for our new Geranium homeowners when considering projects outside of the home such as decks, patios, and privacy screens. We now do a walkthrough on the Board Room TV demonstrating the accessibility of the CCRA website to access Governance information stating the accessibility of the CCRA website to access Governance information. We urge all residents to become more familiar with our website and the wealth of information that lies within. In addition, we direct you to the Township website at Scugog.ca showing how to access By-Laws pertaining to various construction projects.

When sending us a request to <u>governance@canterburycommon.ca</u>, please describe the reason for the request and include a sketch or drawing with dimensions and/ or any other materials you have to support your request in order to expedite our Pre-Approval to you. We are only one click away and the inbox is checked daily to ensure prompt replies to our Homeowners. If you are unable to scan additional documents, kindly provide copies to us when we visit. Once your request is received, one of our three Field Consultants will contact you at their earliest opportunity to make an appointment to visit with you to discuss your project and provide any information regarding Township Permits and, in many cases, the Geranium approval process.

We do anticipate heavier than normal volumes of enquiries over the next few months as the Holtby Court owners continue to move in, and we kindly ask for all of you to please be patient in allowing us time to schedule visits with you. Like all our committees, we are always looking for volunteers to put in whatever time they may have available to assist in the day-to-day operations of our beautiful community. Please feel free to contact us if you wish further information on how you may be able to assist us here at Governance.

We currently have 31 projects approved that we are following for completion and since June 1<sup>st</sup> have provided 19 Final Approval letters to homeowners. My contact information is governance@canterburycommon.ca

#### MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS

As I took on my new role as Municipal Affairs Director/Chair, my first goal was to get acquainted with the folks at the Durham Region Head Office, the Scugog Township, and Kawartha Conservation Authority who represent Canterbury Common. I have a contact person who will direct me to the right department to resolve certain concerns, answer questions and let us know of possible future planning that may be on the books.

I intend to contact the Kawartha Conservation Authority as soon as possible, as there have been some concerns about the Waterfront Trail.

Some of the issues that were discussed last month include clarification of the by-law enforcement issues, leasing/renting issues for AIRBNB, sediment pond issues, traffic and speed control, repairs to our roadways and sidewalks in the community, and finally a tree replacement plan for those trees which are owned by the Township that are dying or are dead on the boulevards. I have asked the department of Public Works to outline their future plans for Canterbury Common. All of this is a work in progress!

#### REPLACEMENT RESERVE FUND

Canterbury has a Replacement Reserve Fund (RRF) which is available to help cover the costs to replace or have major repairs made to aging CCRA assets like the roof, the parking lot or furnace. There are no legal requirements for our association to do so like they have at condominium corporations. However, the Board decided several years ago that it was prudent to have an RRF to reduce the chances of a potential surprise assessment to replace aging assets.

The Replacement Reserve Fund is funded by a portion of our annual assessment (dues). This year that amounted to \$85 of the \$600 annual dues we paid. At the end of our 2022-23 fiscal year the RRF had a balance of just over \$81,000. This money is invested in cashable GICs to earn some interest but be readily available if needed.

Determining the appropriate size of the RRF is not a simple task. It basically involves creating an inventory of all of our assets, determining the replacement cost and the expected life of each asset and creating a big spreadsheet showing when expected costs might be incurred and estimating cash requirements over a 30-year period. This process, while well understood, is based on many assumptions, including the asset repair costs (what will it cost to replace the roof in 15 years?), the expected life span of the assets (will the roof last 15, 20 or only 10 years?) or the rate of inflation of as well as expected interest earned on fund balances.

To ensure objectivity and provide expertise the Board hires professionals to do this work. It is typically updated every three years to validate previous assumptions and make adjustments to reflect the reality of what has actually occurred since the last review.

We have completed a reserve fund study this year which reflects some material changes from the previous one completed three years ago. These include things like new economic conditions brought about by the Covid pandemic, our replacement costs have increased materially, and we have some new assets to maintain like the extended irrigation around the clubhouse and Barry's pathway. We also have more homes to contribute to the fund each year.

The key conclusions of the recent study which the Board will use to help set the annual budgets for the next three-year period:

- Current fund is adequate.
- Total replacement costs have increased by 26% since the last study.
- Expected long term inflation assumptions have increased from 2% to 3%
- The recommended annual increase to amount collected for the replacement reserve fund should increase by 5% annually for the next three years or about \$5 per year.

This study will be an important factor when the Board sets its budget and amount of our annual dues for the following year. He and the late Robert Walker were instrumental in introducing Holstein cattle into this district.

Mr. Holtby served as Reeve for a couple of years and was a member of the Reach Township Council and County Council. He was named Honorary President of the Port Perry, Reach and Scugog Agricultural Society in 1926, and was often called on to judge cattle at fairs across the province. He served for 24 years on the Holstein-Friesian Association. He was widely known throughout Canada and the United States.

Robert served as an elder of the United Church and attended church each Sunday as it was very important to him. His funeral was held in the United Church here in Port Perry which was very well attended.







#### THE CANTERBURY SILVER DRAGONS

During our 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary year, we want to recognize the valuable contribution that the Canterbury Silver Dragons made to our much larger local community. From 2005 – 2014 the Canterbury Silver Dragons participated in the Annual Dragon Boat Festival on Lake Scugog. Over the 10 years, 135 Canterburians were involved with the team paddling, drumming and helping onshore.

When the team was formed in 2005, never having paddled a dragon boat, they began paddling lessons at Uxpool. They also worked on synchronizing their strokes while sitting in chairs inside The Centre and outside in the Canterbury pool.



Through the many years, their hard work and dedication paid off and they enjoyed much success on and off the water. An astounding total of \$124,063.88 was raised by the team for local hospitals (Port Perry, Uxbridge, Lindsay and Oshawa) in support of cancer awareness, diagnosis and treatment. In 2007 the team received recognition, and a Certificate of Achievement, from the then Mayor of Scugog in the annual Mayor's Honour Roll. The Canterbury Silver Dragons also won many Gold, Silver and Bronze medals defeating much younger paddlers.

The number of members involved with the team and the generous donations from the Canterbury community are a true testimony to the caring and generous nature of our residents.









LADIES' GOLF Carol Sambrook

The Canterbury golf course was built in 1996 and opened in Fall 1997. In the spring of 1999, women were forming groups to play golf on Wednesdays, Thursdays or Fridays. The group that I ended up playing in started at 9:00 a.m. on Mondays and Fridays.

There were about 75 homes occupied by then, but we still did not have The Centre since it was under construction. The Pro Shop was located in a trailer on the lawn just north of the construction. Finally, in the spring of 2000 The Centre was opened and the Pro Shop relocated to the basement.



We never actually formed an official league with score keeping and tournaments, but we all had a great time. There were three or four groups with different skill levels, and usually at the end of the season our group would go for lunch in a local restaurant. There are only a few people still living here from the original groups.

Ladies' Golf is still offered at local golf courses like Sunnybrae and Crestwood but they are open to the public.

#### **REFLECTIONS, 2001-2023**

Ann and I moved to Canterbury Common in July 2001. Homes were still being built, but the community was already a success. Organizations were well thought out, and the number of dedicated volunteers to support them amazed us. With golf in full swing, the camaraderie of a well-educated community topped it all.

We backed on to the second green, with sandpits, holding pond, newly planted trees (lindens, blue spruce etc.), views of Cawker's Creek and Lake Scugog, and with months of beautiful sunrises and sunsets, we felt blessed. The fauna, over time, included rabbits, coyote, fox, possum, muskrats, snapping turtles (on their way to lay eggs in numerous gardens or sand traps...and often quickly taken by skunks or foxes), and tree frogs. Seasonally we would see snow geese, swans, arctic ducks, and tree swallows. Herons, wild turkeys, and up to 75 geese at one time could be seen.

Living barriers around the pond have discouraged the geese and reduced their numbers considerably. Its dredging plus the greening of the golf course since its sale has greatly reduced the turtle sightings here. The growth of the trees has diminished our creek, lake, sunrise, and sunset views to a large extent. Due to warmer winters, we no longer see ice huts and trucks on the lake, and snowmobiling has been curtailed. Our ash trees have all been removed.

But with the changes come new experiences, mostly all pleasant. With the new development comes new residents and ideas, so welcome. The neighbours that we have, the volunteers who support us, the community that we live in, all leave me smiling. I hope you are all smiling as well. Here's to continued success in the next 25 years.





#### BITS & PIECES FROM THE EARLY DAYS

Did you ever wonder how our community evolved? Here are some highlights of the early days.

- \* The first house was completed in January of 1997. It was purchased by George and Lucy Dale; Lucy still lives there today.
- \* The Canterbury Golf Course opened in the fall of 1997. League play began in the spring 1998, and continues today at local courses.
- \* The original pool was opened the summer season of 2000. At that time the small pool was located in the south end of the parking lot. The lovely pool we enjoy today was opened in the 2020 season during the Covid pandemic.
- The Centre was not built

until October of 1998; it was not opened until October of 1999 when all agreements were met by the builder. The Board of Directors started early working for residents of the community. They had to fight with the builder to ensure that all amenities were provided as promised. Before The Centre was completed activities were sometimes held in residents' homes. The new version of The Centre was officially re-opened by our Board in 2022.

- \* The first annual assessment was \$100.
- \* In 1998 a meeting was held to elect The Board of Directors. The Board was chosen by residents after a lengthy nomination process. Dave Noble was elected by the Board to act as the first president of the Canterbury Common Residents

Association.

- \* The First Annual Meeting was held Monday, June 21<sup>st</sup> 1999 at the Recreation Center at 1655 Reach Street in Port Perry.
- \* The first issue of *The Chronicle* was published May 31, 1999. The editor was Carole Noble.
- \* The first social event held in Canterbury Common was a New Year's Party to welcome in the year 2000. A dinner and dance was held and enjoyed by all.



There are so many milestones we have reached together. We hope to see many more in the next 25 years.

#### FIRST IMPRESSIONS

Port Perry has been a favourite place to visit for several years. Even though we grew up in the big metropolis of Toronto, I have always felt that I could live here. Good friends introduced us to Canterbury Common, so we finally decided to downsize. We were told about the lengthy document that would be part of the signed contract. We look forward to that day!

On occasion, I have contemplated what it would be like to live here without having to work on a committee, especially since we are retired, but I recognize the fact that growth doesn't happen without full community involvement. Canterbury Common is an amazing place with friendly people, a lovely waterfront trail, a beautiful community centre with an outdoor pool, pristine homes, several common green spaces between the houses, and many activities to suit every need. The people here are committed to making this a beautiful, vibrant community, and this doesn't happen without our volunteers! We feel blessed to be here!






