REPORT FROM YOUR BOARD

Spring is a time of renewal and regeneration and that is apparent in Canterbury. We welcome our new residents who have arrived in the last six months. Nearly forty families have joined us by purchasing existing homes or buying new homes on Holtby Court. By next fall there will be approximately 600 people living in 340 homes – a growth of 41% since 2020. The cycle of regeneration includes the departure of residents who have left our community. They are fondly remembered for their contributions to Canterbury. Among those people are John Howell, a founding director of this Association, Tom Phipps, a member of the current Board, and Barry Smythe, a key member of the Canterbury Transition Committee.

The current Board of Directors was elected last June. Six of the nine directors are serving for the first time. Five directors have replaced others who resigned this year for personal or health reasons. This kind of turnover has become the norm in recent years. Since 2017 twenty-nine residents were elected to the Board. Thirteen served for one year. Five people served a second two-year term. The frequency of these changes caused the Board to review and amend Section 9 of By-Law 1 pertaining to elections and term of office. Two amendments will be presented for ratification at the Annual Meeting on June 14, 2023.

The first change removes term limits which are not required in the Ontario Not For Profit Corporations Act. Directors will still be elected to a two-year term in alternate years – four in one year and five in the next year. The second change removes the restriction that a member in the same home as a current director must wait a year before seeking election after the current director has completed two consecutive two-year terms. Notwithstanding the foregoing, no more than one person from a home can serve as a director at any given time.

The Association has been governed by its Board of Directors since incorporation in 1998. Many past and current residents have served on the Board and many new residents are interested in helping. A constant theme during the Board's consultations on strategic planning is to broaden the volunteer opportunities at the committee and Board level. Committee roles are abundant and make a great starting point for residents who want to share their talents and energy. The Recruitment Policy recommends that candidates for the Board have some prior experience in a CCRA committee but this is not a requirement. Any CCRA member in good standing may stand for election. Interested residents may request more information from the Nominations committee by sending an email to president@canterburycommon.ca.

Preparations are well underway for the Annual Meeting The Administration Committee will be conducting a pre-registration in order to determine the space and seating requirements for our growing community. Make sure you look for the registration form in your Annual Meeting package that will be hand-delivered in early June.

Quorum for the annual meeting is one-third of the members (approximately 100 homes) that are present in person or by proxy. The Board is reviewing the proxy form that can be used by residents who do not attend the annual meeting in person. When members register at the Annual Meeting, they will receive voting cards for themselves and for each proxy they hold on behalf of another member. Details will be provided in the Annual Meeting package. The package will also include an Information Circular that describes the items to be voted on at the meeting.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

We have just completed our budgeting process for the coming year. The budget essentially predicts what revenue and expenses we will have for the coming year. It is the largest component of our annual assessment.

Our operating budget for the current year is as follows in thousands:

Administration 34 Communications 9 Finance 69 House & Property 72 184 Total

House & Property includes maintaining The Centre and land we own which includes grass cutting, snow plowing and numerous other maintenance expenses. Utilities, legal, accounting and insurance are all included under Finance.

The budget process is lead by Doug Thiemann. He works with each of the various groups within the association to determine what they believe they will need to maintain existing services, additional costs coming from the sixty new homes, and any new activities or things we need to buy. This is then aggregated into a total budget for CCRA and reviewed and approved by both the Finance Committee and later the CCRA Board of Directors.

The other component of the annual assessment is the Replacement Reserve Fund which is used to replace existing building and equipment as they wear out or break down. For example, we needed to replace the lights in the parking lot this year and that expense came out of the Replacement Reserve Fund. The Replacement Reserve Fund had a balance at December 31 of \$81,000. The requirements of this fund are reviewed every three years to ensure it is sufficient to cover expected replacement expenses and is being funded appropriately.

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Our CCRA assessment last year of \$550 was made up of \$475 for Operations and \$75 to fund the Replacement Reserve Fund.

We will have some new challenges this year in developing a budget. Inflation is up substantially, and we are adding property from the new homes which we will need to maintain.

GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE

REQUEST FOR APPROVAL THROUGH THE GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE

From June 2022 to the end of February 2023 the Governance Committee has given final approval to 15 projects as required under the Protective Restrictions and pre-approval to 15 other projects which have not yet been completed. With Canterbury welcoming so many new residents we expect our committee to be even busier this summer.

In order to help those of you who wish to have a project approved (e.g. new or expanded deck, storage shed, sunroom, privacy panels, hot tub etc.) we are providing the following process. Any project which involves an addition or change to external areas of your home requires approval through the Governance Committee. Our goal is to make the process as easy and efficient as possible. In some cases, there are differences for the new Geranium homes and those are noted, where applicable.

- 1. Please inform any member of the Governance Committee listed below that you would like to have us visit you to discuss the installation or replacement of a deck, sunroom, storage unit or hot tub etc.
- 2. All applicants will be contacted within 24 hours and an on-site visit from Governance will be scheduled.
- 3. Every request will be reviewed by the Governance Committee.
- 4. To assist us with our review, please have a drawing or set of plans available when we come for our visit. A sketch with dimensions is fine to begin with for our initial visit.
- 5. During the on-site visit Governance will review each request for compliance, advise you if you need to request a building permit and if everything is in order will provide you with pre-approval to start the project. A written pre-approval will be provided to you within 24 hours.
- 6. For Geranium Homeowners, Governance will forward the pre-approval letter, drawings and any other pertinent documentation to Geranium. The letter for pre-approval will state that it is given based on the description of the project at the time of request and spells out the terms and conditions. Geranium will then be in contact regarding the waiver they require prior to the commencement of the build. This applies only to the new Geranium homes.
- 7. Once the project has been completed a site visit by Governance will be conducted to verify that the terms and conditions have been met. A final approval letter will be issued within 24 hours. For the new Geranium homes a report will be sent to Geranium informing them of the consent to the final approval by Governance
- 8. Copies of all documentation, agreements and approvals will be filed in a secure home file at The Centre.

HOUSE AND PROPERTY COMMITTEE

CENTRE GARBAGE CONTAINER AREA: SAFETY CONCERN

Miller Waste cannot return the bin to the fenced area after emptying, resulting in the bin being left on the parking lot, and potentially rolling down the slope toward the Mail Kiosk. The remediation will be to expand The Centre garbage bin fenced area in order to allow Miller Waste the ability to have their truck return the bin to the fenced area without any manual intervention by CCRA resources. Area expansion is being contracted for early spring redesign and expansion.

BARRY'S PATH

The extension of Barry's pathway to the south side of The Centre adjoining with the existing path to the Waterfront Trail, will be deferred until the early spring due to the vendor's delay and this year's winter weather conditions.

THE LAKESIDE MEADOWS (FORMERLY GOLF COURSE HOLE #1)

The wildflower planting soil and mulch delivery will be deferred until mid-summer due to the freeze/thaw cycle this winter. The meadows land has not been able to deep freeze to be able to have heavy trucks deliver soil without causing damage to the meadows.

GARDENS COMMITTEE CHAIRPERSON

The Gardens Committee is looking for a lead position for the support of the gardening team.

Responsibilities include:

- 1. Working with an established group of highly motivated/self-directed volunteers to enhance/maintain all gardens currently located around The Centre, the Coulter Street/Waterbury Crescent sign post and the Simcoe Street/Country Estates Boulevard signpost (includes the island located in this area).
- 2. Facilitate the team's work by ensuring all necessary equipment, tools and materials are available when needed.
- 3. Schedule/chair Garden Committee meetings on an "as required" basis.
- 4. Develop/manage the annual Gardens Committee budget.
- 5. Recruit new committee members if required.
- 6. Attend monthly H&P Committee meetings (can discuss alternatives if this doesn't work for you).

MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS

On the weekend of the 11th and 12th of February, residents backing onto the Lakeside Meadow observed two ATVs driving on our private property in an erratic manner, doing circles and driving in and out of bunkers. On further investigation, we could see that they had driven through the woods, damaging the undergrowth, to access Canterbury lands from the Waterfront Trail. We discovered, through subsequent conversations, that some of our more recent residents had observed ATVs driving down the Waterfront Trail from Coulter St. where it clearly states that motorized vehicles are not allowed.

The Board discussed strengthening the wording on our signage, which currently says, "This Land is Owned and Maintained by CCRA." We are investigating the Bylaws and traffic laws with the municipality and Durham Regional Police and will consider adding, "No Motorized Vehicles" to our signs.

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Mark Stone, Public Works Township of Scugog, advised that we should send a request to the police asking to be added to the ATV Program, for patrols of private property. Mark will also check to make sure that the Waterfront Trail is also included in that program.

It would be helpful if any Canterbury residents, observing this type of behavior, make note of the date, time, and number and type of vehicles, whether ATV's or snowmobiles. Please advise me, Dorothy Bull, so that I can follow up with the Township or the Police.

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





Website Tips and Tricks

Here are a few tips on how to make better use of the CCRA website.

Searching for information

The website has a search box, where you can enter one or more words, or a phrase, and it will give you a list of all the pages that contain those words or phrases.

The search box is part of the Residents menu. If you are using a larger device with a horizontal Residents' menu, click on the magnifying glass symbol at the end of the menu to bring up the search box. If you are using a smaller device with a vertical Residents' menu, the search box will be at the bottom of the menu.

Entering the words garden and house into the search box will show all pages containing both those words, but not necessarily together. If you put the words in quotes, i.e. "garden house", the search box will only show pages that contain the exact phrase "garden house".

Note that this search will only find words in the web pages themselves, not in any documents that are accessed by clicking on links in web pages. Examples of such documents are issues of *The Chronicle*, committee reports, and the Policies and Guidelines document.

Viewing and changing your personal information

There are three buttons near the top of the Residents Home page that allow you to access or change your personal information.

Change your email or password allows you to change the email address or the password associated with your website profile. Note that you cannot change your website username once your website profile has been created.

Change other profile information allows you to change other information associated with your website profile, such as your address or your phone number.

Your CCRA Membership Record gives you access to the membership information that the CCRA has for your household. Your membership record is found by looking at the address associated with your website profile; if

the membership record cannot be found, it may be that you spelled your house address wrong in your profile. You can use the **Change other profile information** button to see the address and change it if necessary.

You can change any of the information in your membership record by replacing the old information with the new information and clicking the "Submit Changes" button at the bottom of the page. This will cause a change request to be sent to the person in charge of maintaining the Membership information database for the CCRA, who will then update the information. It may take a few days for the new information to propagate back to the website.

List of Activities

If you ever want to know who to call to get information about any of the activities going on, there is a page on the website called "List of Activities" which lists all the activities, and the name and phone number of the contact person for each activity.

The List of Activities page can be accessed from the Residents menu, under the Activities menu item. Or, of course, you could always put the name of the activity into the search box and the Activities page should be one of the pages that appears in the search results.

Printing the calendar

If you have access to a printer, you can print your own copy of the CCRA calendar. Simply go to the Calendar page on the website via the Activities menu item in the Residents menu. There you will see a button called "Printable version". Clicking on that gives you a new tab in your browser with the calendar page in a printable format. Click on the "Print" button to open your printer's dialog box, where you can adjust the print settings before printing.

Sending a message to another resident

You can send an email to another Canterbury resident directly from the website even if you do not know their email address, as long as the other resident has a profile on the website.

Use the "Contact a member" menu item under Contacts in the Residents menu to get you to the Members List page. This page lists all the residents who have profiles on the website. You can sort the list by clicking on a list header; for example, clicking on "LAST NAME" will sort the list by last name in ascending order. Clicking on the same header again changes it to descending order. Once you have found the name in the list, click on the "Send" button to the right of the name and you will be prompted to compose and send your email message.

Note that if you send an email to another resident this way, your own email address is exposed in the From field of the email message.

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A TRIBUTE TO BARRY SMYTHE

Barry was the epitome of a life well lived: a man who was so accomplished and successful in his working life as a certified Professional Engineer and Management Consultant as well as everything else that interested and challenged him. Barry showed us what it takes to overcome adversity with dignity, determination and courage that he so bravely demonstrated and endured during his lengthy period of rehabilitation following his accident in December 2021. He has left behind a very large footprint and will never be forgotten in our minds and hearts.

An example of how he served our community so well took place in October 2015. The owners of the 9-hole golf course that surrounded our community were closing the golf course and selling the property to Geranium Corporation who proposed to build an additional residential development that they hoped would be integrated into the existing Canterbury community.

This development, if approved, would require a major renovation and expansion of our Community Centre, along with associated facilities, to accommodate owners buying the 100 plus detached homes Geranium were proposing to build. Gord Simmons, another Canterbury resident, and myself were appointed by the Board as Co-Chairs of a special committee named the Canterbury Transition Committee. Gord and I quickly realized that in building our team to handle this challenging task, and protect the interests of Canterbury homeowners, one of the most critical positions we needed to fill on our team was that of Civil



Engineer. We looked at each other and in one voice said, "BARRY SMYTHE - we must have Barry!!!"

The position would require Barry to spend a considerable amount of personal time on this project that would need managing for several years. We decided to speak to Jane first about Barry joining our committee. Jane was enthusiastic about the idea but made us aware that in spite of Barry's impressive resume, he was very modest about his career achievements.

Later Jane contacted us and said Barry was very enthusiastic about joining our committee and so we had our resident engineer. In the following months and years, as the project moved through its various stages, Gord and I were constantly reminded of the tremendous value that Barry brought to the project and all of the parties involved. Barry never saw insurmountable problems; he only saw solutions. His commitment to the project was inspiring.

In the early part of 2022 our Board of Directors unanimously agreed with a recommendation from the Canterbury Transition Committee that Barry's extraordinary contributions to the Canterbury community should be officially recognized. It was mutually agreed that a tribute would be in the form of a large rock with a plaque engraved: "Barry's Path - In recognition of Barry Smythe who led the way as Canterbury Common's Engineer in Residence".

On the day of the plaque dedication ceremony, Barry gave an amazing, totally unexpected, heartfelt speech of thanks that transcended his limitations in his body. His speech included recollections of some of the events that had transpired during his work on the so called "Geranium Project". It was a very moving moment to observe and it will represent the best and last memory I have of this very special, accomplished, remarkable and courageous man.

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
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

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




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Dear Canterbury Common Friends,






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LIKELY SPAM
